

A PROGRAM FOR YOUR PROFESSIONAL FUTURE

The New Jersey Press Foundation, the charitable arm of the New Jersey Press Association, will award several eight-week paid internships at NJPA-member newspapers for the summer of 2010. These internships are coupled with college scholarships.

YOUR INTERNSHIP

Your paid internship will last eight weeks and must be served at a newspaper that is a member of the New Jersey Press Association.

On the application form (Pages 3 & 4 of this flier) you are asked to list three New Jersey newspapers—including at least one weekly newspaper—at which you would prefer to serve your internship (a list of New Jersey newspapers is posted on the NJPA Web site, www.njpa.org).

While NJPF cannot guarantee you will work at a newspaper of your choice, every effort will be made to respect your preferences and locate an internship near your home. The Foundation selection committee will make the final decision on where your internship will be located.

All internships are subject to approval by the newspaper's publisher and/or editor. Assignments will be made in January.

SALARY and SCHOLARSHIP

The combined scholarship grant and internship salary you will receive through this program is approximately \$3,600, including a \$1,000 scholarship and a weekly salary of at least \$325 (before taxes) for eight weeks. Some newspapers may invite their interns to work longer than eight weeks and some papers may pay more than \$325 a week.

In order to receive the full scholarship grant, you must successfully complete your full eight-week internship (written reports required). The scholarship grant will be made payable to your school and may affect other financial aid you have been promised.

ELIGIBILITY

To receive a New Jersey Press Foundation internship and scholarship, you must be:

- A U.S. citizen or permanent U.S. resident (green card).
- A student at a New Jersey college and/or a resident of New Jersey with a New Jersey home address (NJPF follows the residency rules New Jersey's state colleges use to determine in-state tuition costs).
- Enrolled as a full-time college freshman, sophomore or junior in 2009-2010 and planning to return to undergraduate school in the Fall of 2010.

WHAT TO EXPECT AT YOUR INTERNSHIP

The typical internship or first job, regardless of whether it's at a daily or a weekly, involves working as a general assignment reporter, copyeditor, photographer or graphic arts/designer. That may mean covering a school board meeting one night and taking a photo at a traffic accident the next afternoon.

It's no secret that the depth of experience an intern will receive varies from paper to paper and that dailies give students somewhat different experiences than weeklies offer. Here are some examples:

- Daily newspapers often assign interns to a "beat" or a specialized topic in addition to giving them general assignments. Also, many large dailies ask their interns to help veteran reporters gather background information for articles. Some papers hire interns to work exclusively as copy editors, photographers or graphic artists.
- Interns at large papers, especially dailies, will have their journalistic work evaluated by several people before it appears in print.
- Weeklies and small dailies depend heavily on their interns to produce a large quantity of articles, photos or graphics on every topic. It isn't unusual for an intern at a weekly to receive bylines immediately after starting to work and to prepare dozens of articles, photos or graphics in every issue.
- In addition to reporting and writing news and feature articles, interns at small dailies and weeklies may be asked to take photos to accompany their articles, do some copy editing or to help with laying out the paper.

As with any other company or any other industry, the decision about working for a weekly or a daily sometimes boils down to a personal preference of whether to be a "big fish in a small pond" or a "small fish in a big pond."

NJPF believes that the quality of the internship depends on the newspaper's commitment to help prepare students for newspaper careers.

Every newspaper assigned one of our interns — regardless of whether it's a daily or a weekly — has set as a priority the importance of teaching students how to become outstanding journalists.

CHECKLIST TO SUBMIT A COMPLETE APPLICATION

Please photocopy and/or save on your computer every part of the application you send to the New Jersey Press Foundation. Please carefully read the information below and submit all parts of the application.

1) Autobiographical sketch (500 words or less) describing your journalistic skills and interests that NJNF could forward to a newspaper recruiter looking for a summer intern. This "essay" must contain a statement of your interest in a newspaper career.

2) Your résumé.

3) Transcripts or list of your academic course grades received from all colleges or universities you have attended, including courses taken in the fall term of 2009 (freshmen submit a h.s. transcript and a list of college courses currently taking).

(Unofficial transcripts or typed lists of courses and grades are OK; students who are selected as interns will be required to send official transcripts.)

4) Two letters of recommendation written by faculty members (college or high school), the college newspaper adviser, professional newspaper editors, reporters or others who have evaluated/critiqued your writing that appeared in any newspaper (**not another student or a family member**). Both people who write letters should focus on their observation of your writing and/or editing skills.

5) Three samples of your work (preferably published in a newspaper), neatly pasted on 8 1/2 by 11 sheets.

6) Statement of special financial or family circumstances, if appropriate.
